this accessible text is split into 2 halves initially janet townend takes the reader through the early development and the structure and usage of spoken english in half jean walker explains the history and structure of written english including word formation and grammar it is unusual to find both aspects of this fascinating area of human activity combined in one volume these insights form an essential foundation for teachers student teachers teacher trainers and specialists in special needs and literacy it will be of interest to all who speak and write and are involved in helping others to do so janet townend trained as a speech and language therapist and jean walker as an english teacher both are now specialist teachers and trainers in the field of dyslexia literacy and language

what is the best way to analyze spontaneous spoken language in their search for the basic units of spoken language the authors of this volume opt for a corpus driven approach they share a strong conviction that prosodic structure is essential for the study of spoken discourse and each bring their own theoretical and practical experience to the table in the first part of the book they segment spoken material from a range of different languages russian hebrew central pomo an indigenous language from california french japanese italian and brazilian portuguese in the second part of the book each author analyzes the same two spoken english samples but looking at them from different perspectives using different methods of analysis as reflected in their respective analyses in part i this approach allows for common tendencies of segmentation to emerge both prosodic and segmental sociophilology is a word coined by the author to describe a discipline which combines traditional rigorous philological analysis of texts with the recent insights of sociolinguistics from these combined perspectives he provides an understanding both of late latin early romance language and of the circumstances of the scribes who have given us the evidence the chronological span ranges from the later part of the roman empire to the thirteenth century the focus is on the processes by which latin at different times in different places came to be thought of as being several different languages formal medieval latin and less formal romance languages these conceptual distinctions are most directly represented by the decisions taken to write some texts in a new way there are six sections in the book each containing four chapters section a provides an overview and is entitled latin medieval latin and romance b texts and language in late antiquity c the ninth century d italy and spain in the tenth and eleventh centuries e spain in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries f sociophilology and historical linguistics followed by a concluding summary chapter bibliography and indexes scholars and texts investigated include priscian boniface rhythmic poetry alcuin eulogio de cordoba the strasbourg oaths glossaries glosses and the earliest romance texts of the iberian peninsula general topics considered in detail within the late latin and early romance world include periodization the influence of other languages on the development of latin change of language names the nature of sound change the relationship between speech and writing the relationship between historical linguistics and sociolinguistics and the relationship between language internal variation and language splits

at present the sibe language is the only oral variety of manchu which is actually in use with some 20 000 to 30 000 speakers it is also the most widely spoken tungusic language the sibe people who live at the north western border of the present day sinkiang uyghur autonomous province of china are descendants of the garrison men of the manchu army from 18th century they were sent there after the area was annexed by the manchus with the task to guard the newly established border between the manchu empire and russia being soldiers of an alien army they remained isolated from the indigenous turkic and mongolian peoples which resulted in an allmost miraculous preservation of the language in the 1990s when the oral varieties of manchu in historical manchuria became either extinct or at the verge of extinction sibe kept surviving as a language spoken by all generations of sibe people in the chapchal sibe autonomous county and by the middle and older generations in virtually all other sibe settlements of xinjiang by now although the percentage of sibe chinese bilingualism is high the number of speakers including young people is still significantly great the present description of the grammatical functioning of the two main inflected word classes nouns and verbs is documented by examples and sample texts and provided with the basic general information about the sibe language and its speakers the intention of this work is to offer the reader a more complex image of the sibe language as it is used at present on its historical and cultural territory
